

The Best Simple Two Way Shortbread Cookies



MY MOM'S SHORTBREAD

- 1 cup butter softened
- 1/2 cup icing / powdered sugar
- 1/2 cup corn starch
- pinch salt
- 2 cups flour

MY FRIEND'S SHORTBREAD

- 1 cup butter softened
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 1/2 cups flour

Instructions

- Pre-heat oven to 325° (160 celsius).
- MY MOM'S SHORTBREAD
- Beat butter until creamy. Sift icing sugar, corn starch, salt and flour 4 times (I know, but it is worth it) add to creamed butter a little at a time and work in with a wooden spoon as long as possible, then move to a lightly floured flat surface and knead till mixture cracks slightly. Pat gently to 1/3" thickness. Cut with Christmas cutters and place on ungreased cookie sheets and bake in pre-heated oven for approximately 10-12 minutes, don't let them brown. Let cool on cookie sheets.
- Approximately 30 cookies (depending on size of cutters)
- MY FRIEND'S SHORTBREAD
- Cream butter until fluffy, add sugar and cream together, then add flour gradually and mix with a wooden spoon as much as you can. Move the mixture to a lightly floured flat surface and with your hands work the dough until it comes together and forms a ball. If it is too sticky, wrap in plastic and refrigerate for approximately 20 minutes. On a lightly floured surface roll to 1/2 1/3 thickness. Cut out with desired shapes, place on ungreased cookie sheets and bake in pre-heated oven for approximately 10-12 minutes. Let cool on cookie sheets and then remove to wire racks.
- Yield approximately 30 cookies (depending on size of cutters)





B-7 ½ Make 2 - 12 ½" x 6 ½" bocks

B- 7 ½ Make 2- 12 ½" x 6 ½" blocks



B-7 1/2

Make 4 - 12 %" x 6 %" blocks


Fabric requirements for 8- 12 1/2" x 6 1/2" blocks

B- Background 6 - 7 1/2" sq.

Fabric 1B 2-7 1/2" sq. Fabric 1C 2-7 1/2" sq. Fabric 1A 4-25/8" x 8" 4-25/8" x 10"

Fabric 2B 2-25/8" x 8" 2-25/8" x 10" Fabric 2C 2-25/8" x 8" 2-25/8" x 10"

Cut 2 fabric B 7 ½" squares diagonally twice. These will be used for the bottom triangle of all 8 blocks Cut remaining 7 ½" squares 4- B, 2-1B, 2-1C diagonally once. These are your upper left and right triangles





Sewing Instructions. Match square edge of your 7 ½" sq. background triangle (cut diagonally twice) to fabric 1A 2 5/8" x 8" along the right side leaving a long tail at the bottom. Sew seam and press. Figure 1

Matching top edge Sew 1A- 2 5/8" x 10" to other side and press leave tails Figure 2

Sew background fabric 7 ½" sq. (cut diagonally once) on to right side of 1A leaving a ½" tail at the top. Don't worry about the bottom. Press. Sew on background triangle onto left side and press. Trim block to 12 ½" x 6 ½", making sure you get correct points at the bottom and ½" seam allowance above the top point.

Make 7 more blocks using the correct fabrics

For stitching: Stunning Stitches for crazy quilts by Kathy Seaman Shaw. "480 Embroidered Seam Designs". "36 STITCH TEMPLATE DESIGNS FOR PERFECT PLACEMENT"—all this on the cover alone! If you don't want to use the book in your crazy quilt creations, use it as an art appreciation book. the photos are spectacular! The book is divided into three main parts: templates, stitching instructions, and seam-design illustrations. This is a handworker's paradise—if you take this book out we may never see you again!



For machine quilters: step-by-step TEXTURE
QUILTING 65 NEW Free-Motion & Walking
foot Designs by Christina Cameli. The
chapter headings describe the contents of
the books: Thinking Texturally; Organic
Textures; Textural Fusion; My Top Ten
Free-Motion Quilting Tips; Practice Grids;
Find you Favourite Designs. "Candy
ribbon", "Storm", "Alligator" are some of
the texture quilting designs she shows us
how to create.



For those traditionalists, a book for you: **Quilt Traditions** 12 Striking Projects, 9 Skill-Building Techniques by Devon Lavigne. The cover alone is in very traditional colours but the quilt titles are not: "Little Black Dress" (a combination of paper piecing and foundation piecing); "Potion" (half square triangles, half rectangle triangles, and partial seams!); "Mad Housewife" (using only fat quarters and a lot of directional cutting). [I just learned a new term—"directional cutting". Who knew?]



And really for those break-away traditionalists: **DRESDEN QUILT BLOCKS** *Reimagined* by Candyce Copp Grisham.
"Sew Your Own *playful* Plates—25 *elements* to Mix & Match"—This is what the cover proclaims and the contents deliver; if you are into gadgets this book on page 9 will show you 17 gadgets and supplies you will need *before* you get to fabric, thread, or sewing machines. If you love Dresden Plate and want to expand to different edges, layering and combinations, this is a book for you.




















UFO Committee Director

20/20 Endless Visions Quilt Show **Quilt Categories**



Eligible items for the quilt show are those created within 2 years of the show. The cutoff would then be May 8, 2017.

- S-1: Max perimeter 160". Hand or machine guilted.
- M-2: Hand Quilted or Hand Applique. Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you Max perimeter 280".
- M-3: Self-machine quilted. Max perimeter 280". Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.
- M-4: Machine quilted by someone else. Max perimeter 280". Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.
- M-5: Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample Max perimeter 280. Stipulate who guilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.
- **L-6:** Hand Quilted or Hand Applique. Made and hand quilted and/or hand appliqued by you. More than 280" perimeter.
- L-7: Self-machine quilted. More than 280" perimeter. Made and quilted by you on any size machine. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, pantograph, computerized program, and/or stitch regulator.
- L-8: Machine quilted by someone else. More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph, and/or stitch regulator.
- L-9: Kit, Workshop, or Store Sample More than 280" perimeter. Stipulate who guilted it and whether using longarm, sitdown machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.
- **I-10: Innovative Quilt.** Maximum perimeter 280". Enter the brave new world of art quilts. Show us your original creation, using a variety of materials, not from a pattern or kit. Three dimensional elements such as fabric folding or embellishments are applicable. Be sure to list all of the interesting materials you used.
- 11: New Generation Quilters. For quilters 16 years of age or younger, this is for you. Quilt of any size using any technique.
- 12: Group Quilt. Completed by 3 or more people, any size. What have you and your quilting friends stitched up lately?
- 13: Recycled. Give recycled fabrics or material a second life, any size. 50% of the top must be from recycled fabric or material. Tell us what you started with. No 3 dimensional elements or garments.
- 14: Modern Quilt. Max 240" perimeter. Modern bed or wall guilts depict modern design and demonstrate personal expression and originality in the design, colour and/or techniques. Minimalism, asymmetry, expansive negative space, and alternate grid work are often a part of modern guilt compositions, as are improvisational piecing and solid fabrics. (Taken from CQA National Juried Show) Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.
- 15: Modern Quilt More than 240" perimeter, Modern quilt as described in 14. Stipulate who quilted it and whether using longarm, sit-down machine, computerized program, pantograph and/or stitch regulator.
- 16: Assorted Quilted Items: tablecloths, placemats, runners, bowls & boxes, bags, cushions, etc.

TREAT YOUR SEWING MACHINE TO A SPA!

Is your sewing machine telling you it's time?



What I Saw When I Looked Back.

Acceptance Speech for the

2019 Lieutenant Governor's Lifetime Achievement Award

Saskatchewan Arts Board. November, 2019.

- I'd like to thank the Saskatchewan Arts Board, the Saskatchewan Craft Council and OSAC, CARFAC, and all the other local Arts Councils and Guilds that make up the supportive cultural environment in which we live. Also, Sabrina Cataldo of the Arts Board with whom I had many email exchanges over the last while.
- I decided to be an artist at 14 and now I'm 74. That's 60 years !!! In all that time I never thought of myself as having an art career I've lived an artist's life. I STILL DO, so it was a great surprise to get a Lifetime Achievement Award.
- It's a long view back. How DID this happen? What have I learned? What has sustained me? This is what I want to talk to you about.

First, of course, you need MONEY. To guote Gandhi –

"Enough is enough, but enough is necessary."

- I worked part-time as a clerk typist for 15 years to pay the bills. That freed up the rest of my time to make art. After that, I continued to teach workshops to stabilize the income.
- I worked hard and spent a lot of time trying to figure out what I wanted to say.
- I'm self taught in textiles so I needed to acquire practical skills to say it well.
- **Basically**, I did it wrong until I learned to do it right. I JUST KEPT WORKING.
- From this vantage point, I can say ABSOLUTELY, that THERE IS NO PLAN and there never was!
- I was in my 40's before I realized that PERFECTIONISM was a BAD THING. I used to expect 120% of myself ALL the time. Now, at the end of every art work, I ask myself Is there anything else I can do to improve it? Is it finished?
- If it is finished, I rate it. My criterion now is 87%. (I know, the bar is still high). If it doesn't measure up, it doesn't leave the studio.
- When a new work is finished, I shift my focus to its STRENGTHS, NOT WEAKNESSES. I ask myself

What's new?
What's working?
What is worth exploring further?

- I look at the work of other artists this way, too. When you turn off your Critical Evaluation button, you see and experience SO MUCH MORE!!!!
- Over the years I have actively cultivated a wide circle of artists and friends with whom I can TALK ART. They are invaluable to me when I'm stuck and the ongoing exposure to new perspectives and ideas stimulates and enriches my art practice. These people are absolutely essential to my well being. A number of them are supporting me here tonight. Thank you, Thank you, Thank you.
- As I've already said, THERE IS NO PLAN. This can lead to the darker side of being an artist. It has to do with the perception that MONEY & REPUTATION = SUCCESS.
- Many artists just "give up" along the way. In the later years, the lack of financial security and recognition of the very real hard work we ALL do, can lead to major fears and deep bitterness. It is vitally important that each of us DEFINE SUCCESS on OUR OWN TERMS and celebrate our achievements both personal and in our art practice.
- Getting this award has made me pause and look back. I have been overwhelmed with GRATITUDE for the river of people who have supported me:

My parents My partner, Heather Elliott, Family, chosen family and friends

- Those who organize exhibitions, workshops and lectures
 Our publically funded galleries and the commercial ones, like
 the Assiniboia, who enable me to put my art work out into
 the world
- Those who have purchased that art over the years

 AND all those who showed up to my exhibitions & said nice things to me.
- By looking back, I can now say that the greatest achievement of MY life has been that I have been able to MAKE ART CONTINUOUSLY all these years. This simply couldn't have happened without ALL THIS SUPPORT!

I want to end with another Gandhi quote -

"Understand that whatever you do is inconsequential AND understand, also, that it is ASBSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL that you do it!"




