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I'm not a person to make resolutions, but this year, I'm going to make just one - and that is this: I resolve to spend the year making a temperature quilt. I've bought my fabric, and had it cut up prior to January 1.

I'm ready to take this on! I'm kind of excited by this idea.

The beauty of making this quilt is that if you can't get at it every day, there are excellent records about the daily high and low temperatures. I bought solids in different shades of bright rainbow colours. No matter the temperature, I think it will be a beautiful quilt! I plan to work on it all year. I'll update you on my progress at future meetings.

And I urge everyone to take this on in some way or another. If you don't want to commit to a year, you could just do a month, or a season, or 6 months, and really the sky's the limit for what you can make. You could make a quilt, a table runner, a wall hanging or even a placemat for each month.

Last month we saw the results of the Christmas challenge. I was so impressed by the number of people who participated and made beautiful items. The response felt like a call to action to create another challenge. So let's do it. This idea comes from my friend, Donna. And it's a book/quilt challenge. In this case you could call it a book/movie/quilt challenge. You'll find all the details in the newsletter, but I'm excited about this one as well.

As winter and COVID carries on, I hope you are staying safe, and getting lots of projects done, including your own version of a temperature quilt.

Read the book, or watch the film, then make a quilt, table runner, wall hanging, placemat, potholder, even a purse, as long as is quilted.

This challenge will tap into your creative side. What you make can be your impression of the book/movie, it can depict scene or a character, or quilt how it made you feel. You are only limited by your imagination.

You might be more familiar with it as a movie, but it began as a novella by Truman Capote that was published in 1958. The movie was released in 1961. There is much to inspire us - Audrey Hepburn as Holly Golightly in the film, or the images of New York. Golightly's outfits, jewelry, hats and sunglasses. It was also the birth of the "little black dress."

Moda even made a line of fabric under that name.

It's an iconic story that's more than six decades. And there are some references in both the novella and the film that are terribly outdated 60 + years later - but it's a story that's lived on in popular culture. So let your mind wander and create something!

The Regina Public Library has copies of the book and several DVDs of the film. And the movie version is available on Netflix. I am getting a copy of the novella, which I will be happy to lend to anyone, as long as I get it back.

A year in review

- In person meetings ceased but we scrambled and learned all about Zoom
- We lost our indoor guilt show but again we scrambled and hosted our first outdoor guilt show
- In 2020, through the COVID-19 pandemic, Guild members and the Connecting Threads group guilted mainly at home and donated 447 guilts to the community. 200 guilts were donated to the NICU and 122 quilts to the Pediatric and Adolescent Units and programs at the Regina General Hospital and Wascana Rehab Centre for kids with life threatening illnesses and those in a traumatic situation. 17 bed sized guilts were donated to SOFIA House, 38 to 4 Directions Community Health Centre, 34 to Allan Blair Cancer Clinic, 4 to various other agencies and 32 to women with advanced cancer through the Cardio Science Unit at RGH. 440 quilted placemats were donated in December to the Sask Health Authorities 21 outlets for their Meals-on-Wheels program. 198 pillowcases were donated to the 3 women's shelters in Regina. We also made 405 scrub caps for the ER Units at Regina General and Pasqua hospitals.

In the past 6 years, 2881 guilts, 1565 placemats and 1205 pillowcases have been donated by the Guild.

Covid-19 vaccine: First person receieives Pfizer jab in UK

A UK grandmother has become the first person in the world to be given the Pfizer Covid-19 jab as part of a mass vaccination programme.

Margaret Keenan, who turns 91 next week, said the injection she received at 06:31 GMT was the "best early birthday present".

It was the first of 800,000 doses of the Pfizer/ BioNTech vaccine that will be dispensed in the coming weeks.

Up to four million more are expected by the end of the month.

Hubs in the UK are starting the rollout by vaccinating the over-80s and some health and care staff.

Senior NHS sources told the BBC "thousands of vaccinations" had taken place across the UK on Tuesday.



Quilt Discovery Experience

Pinwheel

Nineteenth century quilts were primarily practical; beauty was secondary. Quilts served as window and door coverings. Hanging quilts on the dirt walls of a soddie, made them seem more homelike. Quilts could serve as privacy walls, creating sleeping areas in a soddie, or one room cabin. Quilts folded and laid on a board placed between two chairs or tree stumps, became a sofa.




When a quilt became so badly worn around the edges that even rebinding could not rejuvenate it, a seamstress would cut it down to eliminate the worn areas, or rework it into a child's quilt. Any quilt was too precious to discard.

The importance of quilts in women's lives was best expressed in the statement of one 19th century homesteader, Lydia Roberts Dunham, who said, "I would have lost my mind if I had not had my quilts."

Polyphemus Moth Necklace - new SK ARTS Acquisition

My newest addition to my "MOTH" series is the Polyphemus Moth inspired necklace.

The Polyphemus Moth is a rare sighting in Saskatchewan, a nice surprise when discovered one evening at Lake Diefenbaker by myself and a previous find in the rhubarb patch by my father.

I have taken this organic theme and provided it with an industrial aesthetic by creating it out of a combination of three metals, adding colour with the surface treatments of anodizing the reactive metals, titanium and niobium and oxidizing the sterling silver, giving it a richness and enhancing the textures. The metallic tones compliment the flashes of greens and reds in the opals and the cherry reds in the tiny garnets.

Need help improving your hand-piecing technique? Designer Jo Morton shares her process.

Jo Morton says: "Hand-piecing is my favorite way to assemble a quilt. Because you don't sew across seam allowances in hand piecing, I can change my mind about the direction I piece my seams. It also improved my hand quilting.

For Best Results:

- Pretend you are trying to achieve small quilting stitches.
- If the seam you are stitching is longer than 1-1/2 inches, take a backstitch at the halfway point to secure the stitching.

Best Needles for Hand Sewing and Quilting Projects

There is no best hand sewing needle for quilting projects, and that's a good thing because quilters can choose from a large variety of needle types to find the right tool for each task. Hand sewing needles are all designed with unique characteristics that make each type more suitable for one type of sewing, but although needles are commonly associated with a certain technique, you might find that choosing one needle (instead of another) has advantages for your own particular style of sewing. The good news is that hand sewing needles are inexpensive, giving us the opportunity to experiment with them without spending a fortune.

Straws (Milliners) ... for people who prefer a longer needle. Like the Sharps they have a small eye, but the fine shank is proportionately longer. Straws or Milliners are loved by EPP specialists like Sue Daley and Sharon Burgess of Lilabelle Lane for the way they pick up the folded edge of fabric. Straws are also the best needle to use for beading and bullion stitch embroidery as the beads and wraps of thread pass smoothly over that small eye and don't get snagged.









Thread Conditioners?



When to Use (And Not Use) Thread Conditioner

Because products like Thread Heaven protect your thread and reduce tangling as you work, you might want to start using it every time you stitch. In fact, once you try it, you might just find yourself hooked on it. That said, some more textured threads aren't suitable for use with thread conditioners. Additionally, some stitchers find that when using thread conditioners on white threads, the conditioner grabs onto dust and dirt, causing the thread to have a grayish cast. In addition to using thread conditioner for embroidery and cross-stitch, it's also useful for bookbinding, quilting, beading, and more.



Committee Reports:


