

I was floored and honoured with this gift. I knew it had to be used for something extra special. Despite her insistence that I make myself a quilt with it, I've used half of it along with some white cotton, to make a lovely guilt for her daughter. It's not just special because it came from her Mom, but special because it will be part of her daughter's new home. Their previous home burned down in 2018, and they lost everything, except each other. Working on this particular quilt has been an absolute pleasure, and has made me grateful for this additional quiet and reflective time.




Stay safe, stay physically distanced and keep quilting.

Who knew our hoarding fabric would come in so handy. Prairie Piecemakers Quilters' Guild is going to host an outdoor show and share. Quilts will be hung over the fences of Campbell Collegiate parking lot and available for all to see. We are giving a 2-hour window for the show and share. Also, we can keep the required physical distance at this location.

All members are welcome to hang up to 3 Covid quilts on the fences during set up. You will be responsible to hang your own quilt. If you are unable to hang your quilt due to physical limitations volunteers will help you. Please attach a sheet of paper with your name and any information you want to share. Masks are recommended, and towels or sheets can be used to cover the fence before your quilt is hung. Clips will be available to secure your quilt to the fence. Please hang your quilt then go for coffee before you come back for the show. We are trying to keep the number of people in the parking lot limited at any given time. There is room for vehicles to drive by so there will be no need to exit your vehicle to see the quilts. You can walk along the fences if you wear a mask and maintain 6 feet between groups.

The guild member enters the name of the quilted item (please provide some details), along with the size (perimeter in inches) on the challenge register sheet. Each completed item with a label will earn an extra point. The completed lists must be returned to me, no later than the next meeting November 3, 2020. At the same time

keep a copy for yourself of the list as a reminder of what you have to finish and show at the guild. The team that shows the most completed items on their lists will win. I will also accept email lists sent to:

When you bring your finished items to the meeting, show them to Challenge Coordinator, (me) Renee B. I will check them off your list and at the end of the night tally team points. Showing your completed UFO at the meeting will give guild members an opportunity to enjoy the quilts at the show and share time.

This Challenge is all about FUN - Cleaning out your quilting room, completing projects that have been collecting fabric fairy dusts for months. The more space — the more fabric you can buy!!


The quilt top with Wobbly, my brat cat, was made from scraps left over from several quilts, no particular pattern, straight lines cut to fit what was needed. It will go to Connecting Threads when done.





The black, white, yellow and blue quilt was made from scraps as well. Connecting Thread Ladies might remember a huge donation last fall that included a large bag of black and white fabric. The bag made its rounds: I made several quilts for Connecting Threads; Cheryl A. got some scraps from the bag; Shelby L. had a go at it as well and when it came back to me, along with the yellow and blue scraps from my stash, another quilt.

The final quilt top is huge—58 x 72. It is "Chill Out" by Zen Chic and was supposedly a free pattern to download—if I could figure out how to download! All the fabric is from my stash and I am hoping another Connecting Threads Lady (Linda W.) with a long arm will quilt it for me.





Getting to know the Canadian neighbourhood ...

We've had some interest from the membership to profile different communities so here iwe go ... (Suggestions for the newsletter are always welcome.)

Bangladesh

While there are no recent official data, however according to the Statistics Canada (2011) there are 34,000 Bangladeshi origin Canadians. The unofficial number of Bangladeshi Canadians as of 2016 is anywhere from 50,000 - 100,000.



It used to be part of India, but was separated when the British Raj removed from the subcontinent. The area was then divided up into India and Pakistan, which, bizarrely, had two parts: West Pakistan (now Pakistan) and East Pakistan (now Bangladesh). This process was dubbed 'Partition'. West Pakistan and East Pakistan were made the same country because they shared a religion, but they were separated by culture, topography, and a huge expanse of Indian territory.

Bangladeshis fought a bloody war of independence from West Pakistan and became a sovereign state in 1971. The right to speak Bangla and maintain local culture was a key focus of the war, and once a year National Mother Tongue Day celebrates and remembers those who fought for it.

Bengalis use 98.69% less electricity per person than Australians.

Most people here are Muslim, but the constitution is explicitly secular.

Bangla is the language, Bengali is the ethnicity, and Bangladeshi refers to nationality (although these terms are used interchangably and can get a bit political). Bangla is the seventh most spoken language in the world.

It's one of the few countries that acknowledge a third gender — you can register formally as 'male', 'female' or 'other'. Male to female (MTF) transgender people, known as *hijras*, are still harshly discriminated against but are culturally acknowledged, thanks largely to the part that eunuchs played in the country's long Mughal history.

Both the Prime Minister and leader of the Opposition are women. The former is the is the daughter of the first PM, Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, known as "Bongobondhu" (friend of Bengal) or the "Father of the Nation". The other is the widow of Ziaur Rahman, who took power when Bongobondhu was assassinated.

TEXTILES – JAMDANI AND BENAROSHI SAREES

Within Bangladesh's long tradition of handloom woven fabrics, the unique technique of jamdani weaving is especially well-recognized. Originating around 2,000 years ago from the delicate and breathable muslin weaves of Dhaka, jamdani became known as the 'flowered muslin' because its name, stemming from Persian words 'jama' (cloth) and 'dana' (woven motif), also echoes the words 'jam' (flower) and 'dani' (vase or container).

Kantha – a South Asian quilting tradition

Originally made from old, recycled fabrics, the traditional *kantha* cloth is an example of 'flat', or unwadded quilting, worked on multiple layers of fabric. Bangladeshi or Bengali *kantha* cloths were made by women for use in their own homes as bedcovers, mats and all-purpose wrappers. The stitching consists of embroidered patterns, ranging from simple floral motifs to elaborate scenes, combined with running-stitch quilting in a colour matching the background fabric. On older quilts, the quilting runs around the embroidered motifs, a technique known as echo quilting.

Today, *kantha*-making has been embraced by a number of projects aimed at preserving traditional skills and generating income for communities. New fabrics are often used, and the word *kantha* has come to describe the stitching style rather than the object itself. The style is now regarded with pride as a symbol of Bangladeshi culture.

Why Do Quilts Cost So Much?

Cost for materials, construction, & finishing for 90" x 100" Queen Size Quilt

Materials for Queen Size Quilt

Fabric for the top: 15 Yds @ \$12.95 = \$194.25 8 ½ Yds backing @ \$12.95 = \$110.08 ¾ Yds for Binding @ 12.95 = \$9.71 2 ½ Yds Batting @ 12.95 = \$35.61 Pattern @ \$10.00

TOTAL cost of Materials = \$359.65 (not including sales tax or markup. Markup is customary in any other business!)

Labor based on \$25.00 an hour (We are NOT Minimum wage, unskilled workers, but skilled Artisans with years of experience and large investments in equipment and training)

Making a Top

(Includes shopping for fabric, prepping fabric, cutting fabric, sewing blocks, sewing blocks together adding sashing and borders) 40 hours @ \$25.00 = \$1,000.00 (What would you expect to get paid working at a skilled job per 40 hour work week?)

Finishing

Long Arm quilting (All over Edge to Edge)
9,000 Sq inches @ .02 = \$180.00
Trimming Quilt @ \$15.00
Making Binding ½ hr @ \$25.00/hr = \$12.50
Sewing binding on and hand stitching the back
380 linear inches @ .30 = \$114.00

Total Finishing cost = \$321.50

TOTAL COST OF QUILT = \$1,681.15

Note: A larger quilt or more intricate pattern or Custom Long Arm Quilting will increase cost

I know I sew slow, but that's impossible, if you consider shopping for fabric, pattern and all the other prep work. I made a queen quilt working almost steady for 3 weeks. The fabric and the pattern had been purchased. Some days I never did get dressed. I had to put it away after the 3 weeks and then got it out later to finish taking almost another week. True, I am slow, and had a lot to learn, but 40 hours???



Make a Collagraph with Mat Board and Construction Paper

What is a Collagraph?

The word collagraph sounds a bit like the word collage, right? The root of the word – Colla is derived from the Greek word for glue – kólla. Many collagraph prints are made by inking and printing from a plate that has been built up with glued-on elements (paper, leaves, thread, etc.).

Can you imagine sealing the surface of a traditional collage with a glossy varnish, and then inking and wiping it to print on paper? Any smooth, flat areas of the collage would wipe clean, but plenty of ink would remain nestled against curbs of applied elements, or textures on the plate.

Recommendation

Cloth Mask Guidelines

While the primary cause of COVID-19 transmission is people who are symptomatic, there is increasing evidence that some COVID-19 infected people never develop symptoms or are not yet sick and are able to transmit the virus.

Health officials have agreed that wearing a non-medical mask (e.g. cloth or other materials) - even if you have no symptoms - is an additional measure you may take to protect others around you, particularly in situations where the recommended physical distancing cannot be maintained, such as public transit.

Wearing a non-medical mask will not prevent you from getting sick. However, it is another way of covering your mouth and nose to prevent your respiratory droplets from contaminating others or landing on surfaces.

People should also be aware that masks can become contaminated on the outside or when touched by hands.

- Avoid moving the mask around or adjusting it often.
- Masks should not be shared with others.

A homemade mask does not replace proven public health measures. The best way to prevent the spread of COVID-19 is to continue to:


- stay home as much as possible;
- practise physical distancing;
- wash your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and water; and
- cover your cough or sneezes with tissues or your sleeve.
